
FORÓIGE MAYFIELD ST JOSEPH'S UBU PROJECT.

Have been very busy in the build up to Xmas.


We work with young people aged 10 to 24 years and run a number of different programmes which include: Art, Music, Cooking, Health & Fitness and Drop In Evenings to name just a few as well as providing one to one and family support.

We deliver Leadership Programmes, Citizenship Events and core group work workshops on a weekly basis.

Mayfield Community Garden is a joint project facilitated by Mayfield CDP and Fidelma from Health Action Zone/HSE.



It took its time to arrive but winter temperatures are finally here forcing a bit of a slowdown for the garden group. Although our gardeners are still working hard, planting garlic and onions for an early crop next year and planting flower bulbs throughout our grounds. So we've much to look forward to in the spring.

Our new ETB tutor Sophie has been facilitating a group to build an accessible sensory space in the back of the CDP grounds. The area around the small pond we dug in the summer is being developed to create a restful seating area that will include a path and plants to capture all our senses, while also enhancing biodiversity and benefiting wildlife. The materials for this project are from a HSE facilitated Lottery Grant we received during the year for this purpose.

We're getting regular visits from our neighbours at St. Killian's. The kids from the Elm and Maple class are a huge help to us: weeding, seed planting, watering, feeding our composter, and other jobs around the garden.

The Outdoor Production QQI course run by Mayfield CALP, funded by CCP Clg. has been using a few of our beds to learn how to better grow, maintain and harvest crops of vegetables. Many of our regular gardeners are attending and we're very excited to see how they can put their new knowledge and skills to use to improve harvests next year!

Mayfield and St. Lukes Tidy Towns

In May 2017, Mayfield St Luke's Tidy Towns was set up by Cllr Joe Kavanagh and it has gone from strength to strength ever since. People living in our community take great pride in their neighbourhoods and public spaces. This is experienced repeatedly in the level of enthusiasm and goodwill that is shown to the Tidy Towns volunteers by local businesses and residents as we pursue our various projects in the community.

The Tidy Towns group engenders positivity, pride in our locality, and a determination to highlight the best of our local community. The name 'Mayfield and St Luke's Tidy Towns' derives from our status as a community organisation that links directly into Cork City Council via both the St Luke's Policing Forum and the Mayfield Policing Forum. It is a simple and direct system and it has proven to be effective. The Tidy Towns Organisation has a management committee which organises the fortnightly cleanups, planting and painting as well as planning future projects.

We would like to thank local businesses for their generous financial contributions throughout 2024.

It is vital to have local business supporting this worthwhile community initiative.

Throughout 2025 we will focus on encouraging biodiversity whilst also continuing our emphasis on litter free streets, and the maintenance and upkeep of existing planting and painting projects.

The following are examples of high visibility projects in the area:

- * Planting and re-planting flowers in the trough and boxes at St Luke's Cross.
- * Planting and re-planting flowers in the three troughs for Mayfield Plants Positivity: Tank field, Colmcille avenue and Boherboy Road
- * Maintaining the parklet outside the Frank O'Connor Library.
- * Planting in the large bed on the Middle Glanmire road.
- * Clean up of foot paths on upper Colmcille road near the business area and general clean-up of the area up to the junction of Old Youghal Road.
- * Litter picking and cleaning throughout the area from Silversprings Hill to Wellington Road. More planting, weeding, painting, and litter picking are planned for this coming year.

The level of local volunteer commitment every Saturday is fantastic and we are looking forward to 2025...

FROM DUBLIN OPINION TO FATHER JACK.


THE FATHER

This is the story of a Dublin family which contributed twice over to the merriment and humour of the Irish people. Charles E. Kelly was born in Dublin in 1902 and was educated at the Christian Brothers School in Synge Street. He left school aged fifteen and got a job as a messenger in the Civil Service. Parts of Dublin were still in ruins after the rebellion of 1916, but Kelly had application and talent. He took part in amateur dramas and taught himself to sketch cartoons. Some of the cartoons were accepted by daily newspapers. He signed his cartoons with the initials CEK, to avoid official scrutiny. The turbulent years of 1918 to 1922 involved Sinn Féin victory in the general election of 1918, followed by the establishment of Dáil Éireann and the War of Independence 1919-21. A Truce in the war was followed by negotiation of the Anglo-Irish Treaty. The Treaty was passed on 7 January 1922 by a narrow margin in Dáil Éireann, and Saorstát Éireann came into being on 6 December 1922. A bitter Civil War broke out in opposition to the treaty, which included the retention of six Ulster counties under British rule.

In a remarkably daring venture, Charles E. Kelly, Arthur Brook and Thomas Collins published Dublin Opinion, a new monthly humorous review on 1st March 1922. The first print run of 3,000 sold out within a week. Eason and company took on the distribution, helping the circulation throughout Ireland.

Kelly's witty cartoon below entitled *The Night the Treaty was signed* shows hopeful Cork men (some in pyjamas) rushing to Dublin to join the Irish civil service. Take note of the satiric detail showing a ruined church and graveyard in the background. Dublin Opinion built a loyal readership which often drew the annoyance of established politicians, while offering criticism of their shortcomings.

The Saorstát initiated a radio station named 2RN in 1926, followed by a Cork Studio named 6CK in 1927, both having limited signal range. The prospect of the World Eucharistic Congress in Dublin in 1932 led to the creation of a powerful transmitter in Athlone. The three stations were renamed Radio Éireann in 1938 under the Department of Posts and Telegraphs. Charles E. Kelly held an administrative post in the service, rising to Director of Broadcasting in 1948.




Charles E. Kelly continued to work on Dublin Opinion for 40 years, while holding an important public office in national broadcasting. Circulation had peaked at 60,000 copies per month and then declined with the advent of television. He sold it to Lelia Doolin and Joe Dowling, and it ceased in 1968.

THE SON

Frank Kelly was born on 28 December 1938, the eldest son of Charles E. Kelly and his wife Cathleen., living in the Dublin suburb of Blackrock. Frank studied at Blackrock College, where he excelled in singing and school productions, but less so in exams. He had to retake his Primary and Intermediate Certificates and managed to pass Matriculation with the help of a grind school.

He studied Law at University College, Dublin, and again spent too much time in college shows. He started sub-editor work at the Irish Press, which allowed him to do professional shows at night. He later spent some time subediting the weekly RTE Guide. He also thrived in minor parts with the popular comedians Jack Cruise and Jimmy O'Dea.



Frank's flair for comedy and creating daft characters took off in Frank Hall's Pictorial Weekly on RTE television, which ran from 1970-1982. These shows combined humour and political satire more popular than Dublin Opinion had been.

Graham Linehan and Arthur Matthews created the hit Channel 4 TV Series Father Ted (1995-98). This hilarious show revolved around three Catholic priests and their housekeeper marooned on a damp parish off the coast of Ireland.

Frank played the demented Father Jack Hackett, rambling and roaring for drink day and night. His trademark shout of Drink! Feck! Girls!! erupted in every episode. His facial makeup took several hours to apply, to the extent that none of the cast would eat lunch with him at the breaks.

Some of the episodes were not for the pious or puritanical. Frank Kelly was a devout Catholic in private life, but he understood the pathos of Father Jack. Dermot Morgan, who had played Father Ted, collapsed and died aged forty-five at the wrap-up party for the third series.

Frank Kelly suffered from Parkinson's Disease in his later years and died in 2016, aged seventy-seven.

We were also happy to welcome new members, exchanging tales of a summer well spent and telling our new members about the fun activities that had taken place the year before.



Since we started we have had many fun club sessions. These included cooking and baking and the leaders got to enjoy the delicious foods the young people made. We have done arts and crafts, and our young people this year as in the years before are so talented. Our new club hoodie was designed including the crest and the name of the club too. During another club session we began our "Warm Fuzzies" where the young people wrote positive notes to their friends in the club and for us leaders which brought a smile and positive vibes to everyone in the room.

At the beginning of November, our members completed the first of their club trainings, the ethos and values training, where they learn about what it is to be a part of No Name Club. This will be followed in the New Year by alcohol and drug awareness training. The highlight of the year so far was on the 16th November with a day trip to Athlone for the National Youth Conference, the first national event of the year with members from other clubs across the country. This event included sports activities, and guest speakers including influencer Garron Noone, speaking on overcoming anxiety and a very topical road safety talk.

Our weekly club sessions continue, most recently watching "Encanto" which everyone enjoyed immensely. We continue to plan our events and activities for what promises to be a mega fun year.

St. Josephs Mayfield is open to any young people between 15 – 18 years of age, and meets in St. Josephs Community Associations, Mondays 7pm – 8:30pm.

These are just a few I have submitted.


First painting is of Kilworth Woods (near Araglen)

Second painting is of Rathcooney during the severe snow spell


Third painting is of a meadow in West Cork where I regularly visit in my camper.

For me Art is so therapeutic and if I'm ever feeling bored, I just take out my paints and brushes.



To all the authors both the living and the dead

Thanks to them we are greatly spoilt for choice

That swashbuckling tale of the treasure hunting pirates
Long John Silver, His parrot, and scurvy crew

While on books old or new, paper or hardback
Long John might not spend money himself

Books have other uses as the writer Arthur Koestler found

TRUMP'S WIN AND THE WORKING CLASS

Donald Trump's election victory should be seen as a stark warning to the political establishment across the world. While his win in 2016 could be put down to the novelty of seeing a celebrity billionaire going to the White House, or to the sheer unlikability of his rival Hillary Clinton, his recent triumph cannot be so easily dismissed.

What is perhaps most notable about his resounding defeat of Kamala Harris is that he managed to appeal to voters across the lines of racial division so deeply inscribed in American society. Even some in the immigrant communities he demonized voted for him. He did this, quite simply, by identifying himself with the working class. In a couple of brilliant stunts, he appeared behind the window of a McDonald's drive-thru, serving burgers to members of the public. He later dressed in a refuse worker's Hi-Vis jacket to respond to Joe Biden's remark that Trump and his supporters are 'garbage'.

However ridiculous or cynical this political theatre might be, it shows that Trump knew he needed to appeal to working class people. And he knew that – despite being a billionaire born into a billionaire family – he could do it effectively. Kamala Harris, who spent the campaign talking about her 'middle class' upbringing, totally failed to break through to the average voter in this way. While Harris warned, quite correctly, of Trump's fascist proclivities, Trump focused on the rising price of food. During the campaign, Trump's running mate J.D. Vance appeared in a supermarket in front of a shelf of eggs to make the point that basic food items were getting too expensive.

In a post-Covid world battered by war, corporate greed, austerity and climate collapse, the working class will punish politicians, such as Biden and Harris, who embody the centrist neoliberal consensus that has dominated politics for 40 years. Part of this consensus is supporting Israel's genocidal war in Gaza and allowing the conflict in Ukraine to drag on with no end in sight.

The historical facts tell us that in times of crisis, when people are desperate for some revolutionary change, fascism comes to capitalism's rescue. Hitler – who hated Marxists almost as much as he hated Jews – added the word 'socialist' to the name of his party because he understood the popularity of socialist politics amongst the German working class, who were literally starving to death in the 1920s because of rising food prices.

There is no need to compare Trump to Hitler, and the fascism of this century does not necessarily have to resemble the fascism of the last one. But when people start to go hungry, reactionary and dangerous figures such as Trump will be waiting to channel working class anger and discontent.

None of this can be separated from climate politics. Climate collapse is a key driver of rising food prices. Extreme heat and drought affect crop yields. Extreme weather disrupts global supply chains. The political establishment may speak of climate 'targets', electric vehicles, and solar panels, but they have no real intention of challenging the might of the fossil fuel industry.

The socialist left, in Ireland as in America, must be able to distinguish themselves sharply not only from the likes of Trump but from the neoliberal establishment politics that working class people are rejecting. To do this, they need a powerful story about a better future, one in which the real villains of this world are called to account.

A good friend of mine drew my attention to an upcoming concert to be heard on RTE Lyric FM which was on Friday 8th November.

The Norwegian virtuoso violinist, Mari Samuelson would direct the RTE Concert Orchestra in a performance of music that would include a work by Karl Richter, a remaking, updating, recomposition of Antonio Vivaldi's world-wide-loved set of concerti, The Four Seasons. The intention of Richter was to draw attention to Vivaldi's work and to make it loved afresh and though no amount of remastering could overshadow Vivaldi's original work of beautiful, simple ingenuity the recomposition succeeded in its intent and made itself loved too.

From the beginning the director and orchestra must have enjoyed themselves immensely, showing a virtuosity that must have rivalled that of the girl pupils at the school in Venice where the 'red priest' taught and composed.

The recomposition began with a striking 'Spring' crowded with wonderfully alive birdsong on strings and brought us through seasons set in landscapes of misty orchards and fields, vigorous storms and cheeky, spirited, syncopated dances, including great glimpses of Vivaldi's original settings.

The audience attending the concert were obviously thrilled. There were tumultuous outbursts of spontaneous applause, clapped and vocal, after every evocative movement. We were all nudged too to listen again in our own time to Vivaldi's original.







How we came about: Under the HSE Corporate Plan 2020-2023, the HSE National Service Plan, and in line with Recommendations 24 and 40 of Sharing the Vision: A Mental Health Policy for Everyone, HSE National Mental Health under New Development funding is piloting the implementation of Crisis Resolution Services (CRS) offering an alternative response to inpatient admission, when appropriate in line with the National Model of Care for Crisis Resolution Services. Crisis Resolution Services are intended to be an integral part of each community mental health service into the future, through the provision of crisis resolution teams and an out of hours 'crisis cafés'. These crisis cafés are known as "Solace Café". There are plans for 5 of these Solace Cafés to open across Ireland, with the first Solace Café opened here in Cork City, July 2023.

The Vision for Crisis Solace Café services is:

'To provide integrated Crisis Resolution Services to people referred with the right response at the right time for the right amount of time to enable and empower people on their recovery journey'.

What we do: Solace Café is a free out of hours friendly and supportive community space open to anyone requiring mental health support. You may be currently in mental health services, or you may never have been in the mental health services before but are experiencing a crisis now. You may also be supporting a family member experiencing a crisis. We are here for everyone.

Solace Café provides a calm, safe, welcoming and non-judgmental environment which supports individuals and their family members/carers to deal with an immediate crisis and mental health difficulty, and to plan safely drawing on their strengths, resilience and coping mechanisms to manage their mental health and well-being. It is a non-clinical and non-therapeutic environment which supports people with recovery planning, signposting to community services and empowering and building resilience and coping strategies using a strengths-based approach.

Our Staff: Solace Café is under the governance of Cork Mental Health (CMH). Established in 1962, Cork Mental Health is the longest established mental health organisation in Ireland. CMH is a voluntary organisation developed to actively support and empower people with mental health difficulties through the promotion and provision of high-quality housing, community and educational projects. Through their training and their own experience and recovery of mental health challenges the staff in Solace Café provide peer support either on a one-to-one basis or social support at the community table. The team consists of core trained staff and volunteers. Service coordinator Moire McCormack states that "We see the benefit and transformative effect that sitting and connecting with an empathic, non-judgmental, warm person and having a cup of tea and a chat can have. Our service users thank us for making them feel safe, accepted and in some instances, saving their lives". Since opening in July 2023, the need for an out-of-hours crisis Café of this type is evidenced by the number of persons that have attended our service already and who have indeed found "solace" here. Solace Café was officially launched on 25th of March by Minister of State with responsibility for Mental Health, Mary Butler.

Opening hours and Location: Solace Café is open from Thursday to Sunday, from 6.00pm to 11pm, with the last appointment at 10.15pm. Booking is essential, as it is not a drop-in service. People can self-refer to the Café by calling the number 083 8855990 to speak to a member of staff and make a booking. The Café is located at 22 Sullivan's Quay, Cork City, T12 PH6N.

A falling business, a bad relationship, marriage, family or friends, moving and decluttering one's life. It could have been anything but I bet you feel stronger. It takes time to come out of a turmoil situation.

Those who hold on to the past will never get into the future.

For the past 30 years I have scribbled in journals this famous book I constantly spoke about. Every year I would say “I'll be happy when I write my book”. My Son Jonathan used to say “I've been listening to that book since I can remember”. He had his first book out and my daughter was on her second business workbook. Remember no one can tell you, it's like giving up cigarettes, it has to be your determination to give up, that's the only time it will work. Sitting at the airport in Italy in 2021, my son's partner asked what my next project was going to be. Immediately I said I'm going to finish my book. My son actually just gave a familiar stare over. I had a few chapters and showed her. I said I'd have it published by March 2022 (30 years in journals). It actually took me 3 years to complete but in Nov 2023 I decided to get serious. I took Jan to April off work and dedicated my time to completing the book. I so longed to write. (My Dad was a great writer, he taught us everything from Latin to maths, My Mom taught us Shakespeare, poetry and music) He always wanted to write a book and this book was totally driven by his memory). In April 2024 with determination I published my first book.

This was my project for 2024 in the midst of riding the waves of life. It has been a wonderful year. The excitement is beyond explanation. Look at life as a journey, I do not care if you're 19 or 90 let 2025 be your best year. Take up AI online, get up to date with everything, go barefoot in the sand at the beach as you must recharge and regroup your mind. Make life simpler, have less bills, downsize just get rid of every worry around you. Hard if you have children but you will get out the other side alive believe me. Celebrate your achievements, prioritize self-care, limit negative influences around you, join social groups, check on your finances, create a success plan for 2025, and plan fun activities for a balanced lifestyle. Give up what's causing anything that's taking you away from achieving the best life you can have. Stay in charge of your life, age has nothing to do with it. Look at time as a bank, be careful how you spend it. Stay flexible, plans and life can change in a second. Take care of your soul, look out for neighbours and community around you.

Have the best Christmas and New Year, for those who have lost loved ones. They will always be around you in spirit. Life is hard, a journey of ups and downs. Be that rose that grows amongst the weeds of life. The weed are there for a reason. Push through, you will get there and be so proud of yourself.

End 2024 on a positive note and I will see you on the other side in 2025.

What is LGBTQ+ Pride all about?

Pride is an annual protest for LGBTQ+ rights and equality and also a celebration of the many contributions made by the LGBTQ+ community to history, society and cultures worldwide. In most places, Pride takes place throughout the month of June each year in commemoration of its roots in the Stonewall Riots of June 1969, where LGBTQ+ people in Manhattan decided to protest against ongoing police harassment of LGBTQ+ people and spaces.

Here in Ireland, because we are a relatively small country, Dublin Pride usually happens in the last two weeks of June and the other Pride festivals around the country take place from late May to September, with Cork LGBTQ+ Pride Festival taking place annually in the week leading up to the August Bank Holiday weekend.

COMING OUT – a term used by LGBTQ+ people to describe their experience of discovery, self-acceptance, openness and honesty about their LGBTQ+ identity and their decision to share this with others when and how they choose. There is no right or wrong timeline for figuring out your sexual orientation or gender identity. The first person that we must come out to is ourselves. If you have figured it out and would like to share that part of your identity with friends, family or others and you feel you are ready to come out – here are a few things to consider:

WHO? Although it can be daunting to think about telling anyone, for most people there will be certain friends or family members that we might find it easier to broach the subject with in the first instance. Find allies in your family. If you think a brother, sister, cousin, or aunt will be easier to tell for example, then start there. If you are feeling anxious or worried about coming out to any particular people in your life, you might find it useful to bring along someone supportive when you plan to tell that person.

WHEN? You don't have to tell everyone all at once and you can do so over time. For some people it might be a case of "well I'll come out to my family, when I have a partner". Whatever your approach is, consider the timing of your coming out. Generally, with any major life news it is a good rule of thumb to avoid any major announcements while someone is driving. Similarly, a time of high emotion or stress or a major family gathering may not be the best time for you to come out as it might be a lot of pressure for you, but every person is different and only you will know what is best for you and your family.

WHERE? As coming out can be quite a personal and potentially emotional event for both you and the recipient of your news, consider the setting carefully. A safe quiet space might be more comfortable for you and the person you are telling.

How? Practice what you are going to say beforehand and prepare for follow up questions that might crop up such as "why do you think that?", "how long have you known?", "who else have you told?", "do you want me to tell X person?"

WHAT TO EXPECT? Be prepared for different types of reactions. Be patient with people, for you, you most likely have had quite some time to come to terms with this yourself, while for the person you are telling, it is the first time they are hearing this information. While it is natural for us to expect our loved ones to be instantly supportive, it may take a little bit of time for them to adjust to the new information. If someone doesn't react in a way that you would like, make sure to speak to someone who is supportive whether that is a supportive friend or family member that you have already come out to or the *National LGBT Helpline* (1800 929 539).

SEEK SUPPORT IF YOU NEED IT- In the Sexual Health Centre through the LGBTQIA+ Sexual Health Support Service I provide one-to-one support to anyone who might be struggling with their sexual orientation or gender identity, as well as support for people who might be facing challenges with the coming out process. HOW TO SUPPORT SOMEONE WHO HAS COME OUT TO YOU Someone who is coming out feels close enough to you and trusts you sufficiently to be honest and risk losing you as a friend. It can be difficult to know what to say and what to do to be a supportive friend to someone who has "come out" to you. These are some suggestions you may wish to follow.

- ◆ Thank them for having the courage to tell you. Choosing to tell you means that they have a great deal of respect and trust for you.
- ◆ Respect their confidentiality. Allow them the integrity to share what they want, when and how they want to.
- ◆ Tell them that you are still there for them. Be the person you have always been. The main fear for people coming out is that their friends and family will reject them.
- ◆ Ask questions you may have but understand that they may not have all the answers. Or, better yet, do some research or check in with support services.
- ◆ Offer and be available to support them as they come out to others.
- ◆ Check in with them during the time right after they have come out to you. This will let them know you are still there for them.
- ◆ Don't allow them to become isolated. Let them know about support services, organisations and places where they can meet other supportive people.






HOW WE MADE A FILM IN THREE DAYS.

Cork has sadly never been blessed with a robust film scene, even with the boost The Young Offenders gave the Rebel County. However you would be surprised at what you can find around the place, including a 48 hour short challenge my friends and I collaborated on during the summer. We got the bug for this after, and it helped when an opportunity to enter a horror-based short competition in Limerick loomed.

The Big Shots Limerick had set up a Big Spooks Halloween Screams Competition with 3 weeks for us to make a 10 minute short film. I floated this by our crew and Doreen, who was our director for the previous short Momentum, wrote a script to fit the theme.

If you've never entered a shorts competition before there's occasionally certain criteria that need to be met. For our film we were given "Monster from the Deep", assigned a prop (vanity mirror and brush) and given a line ("It came back. It always comes back").

With the script written, more logistical matters like a location was needed to be tackled. I ruled that my own house could suffice. A problem arose however; I had to be at my mother's to dogsit and shooting at my place required I be there. The simplest solution, of course, was to write the dog into the script!

The cast was originally envisioned to be Mike (who starred in our last short) and his roommate Cathal. However, Mike became unavailable. We agreed keeping Cathal in mind would work great for the part written so I messaged him and arranged to pick him up. Problem was he worked full time and I didn't want to utilise too much of it, so we have our co-lead for exactly one evening. Doreen got another actor in for the lead Michael-trading a Mike for a Michael. After all this we only had a week to finish.

Taking on director duties this time was Emma, who worked as the cinematographer on our last short. Essentially she and Doreen switched places. One of Emma's innovations was that of a toy racecar-part of the creature moving was causing chaos running around the living room. Emma found a 20-year old toy car still functioning to use as the prop while covering it in clothing.

The actual premise of the short: Michael and Cathal play housemates Joe and Stephen. Joe is frustrated at Stephen's slobbishness and lackadaisical nature, and decides to do the laundry to remove a pile of clothes his disengaged housemate has neglected to clean. Going to the linen basket, however, a creature appears to have taken refuge and attacks Joe using clothes. Part of creating this was showing the usually inert clothing attack Joe in various ways; this was created using stop-motion.

Stop-motion is a filmmaking process used primarily for animation but also can apply to special effects which is relatively simple to outline. It's when you move objects in slow increments and shoot them individually, creating the effect of motion. You would likely see it in the animated films of Aardman, or most famously the films of Ray Harryhausen. This took up a lot of the logistical methods as Doreen and Emma had to discuss and work around various facets to create these effects. With this in mind production began.

Day 1 was taken up mostly by prep and getting insert shots. We tried to film everything in the bedroom on that day but that proved to not be feasible. One trick Doreen picked up was covering the windows in tin foil as the film took place at night and we shot most of it in the day. My room had never been so dark.

Wednesday took up the bulk of the shoot. Between the shots in the hallway and bedroom with Michael wrapped up and going over his dialogue with Cathal which didn't require the special effects we managed to get all of this through and wrapped on both actors as Michael was no longer available due to work commitments. However, managing to get all of their shots wrapped we just needed some insert shots and could get everything finished to give Doreen more time to edit and hand it in that Monday. Most of this was insert shots and putting in the stop motion we didn't need Michael for.

One issue came up: Alfie. We never shot anything with him Monday so he wouldn't actually interact with our leads. Determined we were to get him in, as soon as Doreen and Emma finished with the bedroom and hallway shots I had the unenviable task of trying to get Alfie to do anything for us.

Part of the script was Alfie would run away scared and react when the clothed-covered car went up to him. He did not. He didn't react at all to it even. So tempting him to run around with ham, we got the shots we could use and edited around to make him appear frightened by our monster. Wrapping on Alfie and soon after our film was completed.

We went to the premiere of it about a week later in Limerick. The screening however was a success and we even got a special mention for effects. However, the real reward personally was having people come up and compliment our film and think it's cool. Alfie got an aww (unsurprising) and an ad-lib Cathal did I really liked got a huge laugh. Which is the biggest reward we can have personally. If you wish to watch it, the film is now available on YouTube! Just search the title: Monster from the Deep (of the Linen Basket) And that was our film shot entirely in my house right around the Mayfield area! We're looking to shoot a Christmas film next...



ORANGE AND CHOCOLATE ICE-CREAM

This is a delicious dessert that will keep in the freezer for up to six weeks! feeds 8- 10 people

Ingredients

- Zest of an orange
- Juice of $\frac{1}{2}$ an orange
- 4 large eggs, separated

- 100g golden caster sugar
- 300ml cream
- 100g chocolate, finely chopped

Method

Line a 1 liter loaf tin with cling film.

Put the orange zest and juice, egg yolks and sugar in a bowl. Beat until thick and creamy.

Beat the egg whites until stiff, set aside.. Now beat the cream until it holds its shape. Fold the cream into the egg mixture, then carefully fold in the egg whites.

Stir through the chopped chocolate and spoon into the loaf tin.

Cover the surface with cling film. Place in the freezer for about two hours. When frozen wrap in tin foil.

Serving Suggestions Unwrap, place on a serving dish and decorate with chocolate curls/grated chocolate.
